

Xi Colony Paves Way for ZBT's Return to Georgia Tech

Another academic year has begun at the Georgia Institute of Technology, bringing the kind of excitement seen only on college campuses in fall. In addition, we are fortunate to have assistance from other trustees and alumni volunteers, most notably **Dan Lawrie '93**, **Brian Anulies '91** and **Mark Weilandt '94**.
