Upgrades Continue at ZBT

House Improvements Include Electronic Locks and Landscaping

Upgrades continue at ZBT! Recent improvements include:

- Installation of new sod in the front yard, along with a set of specimen plants to replace the old holly on the west side of the house.
- Replacement of exterior locks with a new electronic key fob entry system.
- Pruning of trees to keep them healthy, remove dead wood, thin canopies, and set branches back from the house.
- Installation of gravel on our property in the parking area to the west of the house.

DEVELOPING OUR ACTIVE CHAPTER

ZBT Continues to Sharpen Chapter Image in Academics, Philanthropy and Athletics

Brothers More than Double Community Service Hours Compared to Past Semesters, Raise Money and Awareness for Children's Healthcare

This spring semester, Xi Chapter adopted three focus areas on which we want to base our chapter image - academics, philanthropy and academics.

First, in academics, we compiled a 3.01 GPA. Eight brothers were named to the Dean's List, and one attained Faculty Honors.

Philanthropy has been a second area of focus, and we posted 400 hours of philanthropy and community service this spring. This more than doubles our total hours from any previous semester.

Our two big successes included our annual Get on the Ball week and our participation in Georgia Tech's Dance Marathon, which is sponsored by GT For the Kids. Both efforts aid ZBT's national philanthropy Children's Miracle Network Hospitals (CMNH), which raises funds for children's healthcare and research. During Get on the Ball, brothers roll

a large ball across campus and various places in Atlanta, collecting signatures and pledges for donations. It is an attention-getter.

We had a number of brothers on the GT For the Kids executive board this year, and their campus-wide Dance Marathon event raised over \$85,000. This money was donated directly to Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, a CMNH member hospital.

In addition, ZBT also won a competition held by GT Engineers Without Borders in which competing organizations donated loose change to their efforts. We wound up donating a tub filled with coins to win.

Finally, in athletics, we competed in four leagues this spring and almost made the playoffs in each one, missing by just one game. Next semester, we plan to make it to the playoffs in each sport.

PHI EP HISTORY

The Great Whistle Heist of 1950

A Group of Phi Ep Brothers Is Behind a Half-Century-Long Prank at Georgia Tech

It's time to finally 'fess up that a group of Phi Ep brothers is behind one of Georgia Tech's biggest and most mysterious heists, one that was kept secret for nearly 50 years. The story begins when the original steam-powered whistle that sat atop the A.C. Holland Power Plant went missing in the early 1950s. Even more remarkably, it was returned to its rightful owner nearly a half a century later.

According to legend, as told by **Al Lowi** '51, a group of Phi Ep brothers succeeded in their plan to pull off this master prank.

"The principal person to be recognized in this caper is Marvin 'Stu' Stuart '51 (now deceased)," said Al. "Stu was not the first to attempt the whistle heist. He was just the one to succeed as the principal steeplejack and hacksaw artisan."

Stu and crew got the prized possession back to the Phi Ep house where it was the envy of the brotherhood.

"Stu was 'lucky'," said Al. "He won custody of the whistle in a crap game at the Phi Ep house in 1951 and cared for the fugitive (my term) all these many years (Stu refers to it

as the "Holy Grail").

Stu always thought he might face charges, so he kept the knowledge to himself, convincing his brothers he had parted with the treasure. He even allowed the rumor to prevail that the whistle was buried in the front yard of the Phi Ep house. But he had kept it all of these years.

"It was not known for sure that Stu still had possession until 1990 when another of the daredevils from that midnight expedition back in 1950 and fellow Phi Ep brother, **Lewis Levenson '52**, got sight of it during a visit with Stu at his retirement place in the High Sierra," Al said. "Lew told me about it afterward, and then I breeched his confidence at the class reunion of 1991. That's how I got involved with the return expedition and I hoped I would not live to regret having blown Stu's cover and coaxed him to give up his treasure without any assurances of escape from infamy."

The whistle was returned to Georgia Tech in 1996, when the thieves decided the statute of limitations had to be long expired, and shipped the whistle and other historical memorabilia back to Atlanta.

Al added, "This story would not be complete without mentioning that Stu, Lew, my brother David Lowi '53 (the chapter president at the time) and I were fraternity brothers and co-conspirators. Stu was my roommate who shared with me his pop's prized homemade Philadelphia zinfandel. Lew was my Navy buddy and partner in the most bizarre fraternity initiation stunt anyone ever heard of. My brother David shared his 'lucrative' G.I. Bill stipend with me, on occasion picking up the tab at the Fox, the Varsity, the Yellow Jacket and Harry's beer and steak joint. He also bought some parts for our '28 Chevy 'Reck. We were all thoroughly involved in all aspects of the meager social and extracurricular bill of fare Tech had to offer in those days. We have been close friends and confidantes since 1948. My brother and I were second generation Techsters and Phi Eps so we sort of knew what we were in for when we matriculated. It was otherwise for Stu, Lew and many others of my acquaintance. We were all remarkably innocent."
