

Quality, Not Quantity, Makes for Great Story

Lee Sterne's Life Reads Like a Novel, So It's No Surprise That He Started Writing Them




Lee Sterne '50 didn't spend as much time in the Phi Ep Pi house as his pledge brothers did, but there was an awfully good reason.

The first time he lived in the house, he got a semester under his belt before enlisting in the US Army Air Force as a bombardier cadet in January of 1943. After the war was over, he came back to the house and to his brothers, and got in another year before his father needed him to come home and help with the family food brokerage business. That move led to a lifelong career in food brokerage and then real estate.

Fast forward to today – Lee writes to us from the independent living section of a retirement community. He mentions that he's active for 92, even though that's pretty plain to see. After retirement at the age of 83, he started to write short stories. His first novel, *A Skeleton in the Tree* is available on Amazon.com and Barnes & Noble.com, and he's on his fifth draft of his next novel, *Corpus Absentia*, about fraternity brothers. And even though the people and setting of Corpus Absentia are fictional, his love for his time at Phi Ep Pi is evident in the stories he spins about his time there.

When he starts a story, "I hope the statute of limitations will protect me..." you know it will be a good one. In 1946, Tech played Georgia. Georgia had been #1 until it lost to Auburn two weeks earlier, and Tech took over first place in the ratings. The game was to be played in Athens. Four brothers got the wild idea to seed the field at Stamford Stadium with rye grass.

They bought a bag, borrowed a car and drove to Athens in the middle of the night, climbed the fence and laid out (in letters ten yards high) the words "BEAT GEORGIA" with grass seed. On the day of the game, they visited the Phi Ep house in Athens. The Phi Ep brothers in Athens were in a gambling mood and wanted to bet on the outcome of the game. Lee and his brothers kept refusing until they were offered 35 points and odds of 3–1. The final score ended up being Georgia 42, Tech 0, and the grass didn't come up till spring. Lee confides that he's never bet on another game since then (no word on whether his retirement community battles secretly-planted rogue rye grass).

Another favorite memory of Lee's is of the demolition party that occurred a year or two after he left school. He still lived in Albany and came back for the event. The fraternity had just received their buyout offer for the old house on Williams Street (the location is now a part of I-75) and some of the members became overly enthusiastic and began to use the decorations (sledge hammers, chisels and the like) for the

purposes intended, but not too wisely, since it would be at least another year or two before the house would actually be vacated for demolition.

"I wasn't in the house as long, so I have fewer memories than my brothers," he said when we interviewed him, but it didn't ring quite true. Maybe his abbreviated moments in the house made everything more meaningful and memorable. It was those short months, after all, that fueled the setting and characters for his next novel about fraternity brothers in southern Alabama grappling with a mystery.

His time at Phi Ep Pi is playing out in vivid stories, and readers like us are all the better for it.
