ALUMNI PROFILE

Fraternity experience prepared Brother Cripps for a successful career in the film industry

Lasting friendships are always a significant outcome of joining a fraternity, and for **Andrew Cripps '81** it was no different. He joined Zeta Beta Tau in the fall semester of 1979 with about 10 others who also lived in the dorms at the time.

37 years later, Cripps is still in contact with some of his brothers and tries to see them annually. Some of his favorite memories involve intramural

involve intramural sports and the celebrations that usually followed. The chapter meetings, were also "a great source of amusement."

Cripps' experience with his fraternity helped him mature as a person and he considers it a "great time of growth, learning and friendship."

"That experience shaped who I have become, and will always be a cherished period of my life," he said.

After graduating, Cripps earned his MBA in international business at Georgia State University, and started working with Johnson & Johnson. He later moved to Tokyo, having grown up in Japan speaking fluent Japanese, to work for United International Pictures.

In 2007, he joined Paramount as

President of Paramount Pictures International and then moved to IMAX as President International in 2012. Recently, after 25 years in London, Cripps moved to Los Angeles as President International of Theatrical Distribution for 20th Century Fox, where they release 15 to 18 films per year around the world.

His wife, Louise, and three kids still live in London, so Cripps tries to see

them as much as possible. He also tries to meet up with his brothers, but they primarily keep in touch via email. Despite the number of years that have passed and the distance between them, they have been reasonably successful in getting together for things like golf and homecoming.

Cripps is currently on the board of the Scheller College of Business, which gets him back to campus twice a year. He tries to visit Georgia Tech on a semi regular basis, helping him to still feel connected to Zeta Beta Tau.

NATIONAL UPDATE

NIC Bolsters Health and Safety Standards Nationwide

Despite no-hazing policies, no campus is safe from the fraternity-related injuries, deaths, and other tragedies that have dominated headlines recently. In response, the North-American Interfraternity Council made some major announcements in 2017 regarding the need for improved safety and health measures for fraternities nationwide.

"Now more than ever, students, alumni, community members, national organizations, and university administrators must come together to create ownership and accountability toward measures for change," Judson A. Horras, NIC president and CEO, wrote in a December letter.

As part of these efforts to bolster safety, the NIC hired Archie Messersmith, a Sigma Phi Epsilon alumnus, as its Director of Health and Safety. He will lead the implementation of the NIC's health and safety standards, which build upon already existing prevention efforts. According to the NIC, the framework will introduce:

- A medical Good Samaritan Policy to encourage fraternity members to contact 911 in any medical emergency situations.
- Baseline health and safety programming to ensure all NIC member fraternities are providing required health and safety education to chapters.


 The Social Safe pilot program that empowers the NIC to work with campuses to remove hard alcohol from the fraternity experience, provide a more academiccentered fraternity experience, and foster safer social events for members and guests.

It's a big job, but Messersmith spent the previous five years in various roles for Sigma Phi Epsilon, directing member safety, risk management operations, expansion efforts, university partnerships, and alumni/volunteer services and support. Notable accomplishments include leading SigEp's sexual assault prevention curriculum "Got Consent?" and co-developing the "Live Your Oath" campaign.

"The NIC is embarking on an enormous task of working with not just individual chapters, but entire communities to change the culture from the inside," Messersmith said in a statement last fall. "I am honored to be standing alongside such a great team at this pivotal time in our industry."

The Greek Life community is filled with people who care deeply about the future of fraternities and believe in its power to shape the lives of young men and create opportunities for them. Their support will be critical as the NIC works to improve student safety, eliminate risks, and secure a future for fraternities.
